From the Principal's Desk...

We have had a great start to the term with students getting down to their schooling. I hope that everyone had a great break and are now looking forward to getting back to normal school programs in another challenging term. Reporting to Parents

This afternoon parents and caregivers have been invited by the school to meet with their child/ rens teachers to have a conversation about their child's progress so far in 2020, by reflecting on the recently distributed reports. This is not the only time that you can have a conversation with your child/ren's classroom teacher/s. Please do not hesitate to contact the school to organise a meeting time or communicate directly with the classroom teachers.

Parent Communication and Access to Classroom

At the end of last term, we put out a survey to parents and carers to get feedback on parents in classrooms. I thank everyone who took the time to complete it and some of the very detailed answers that were given. As a school administration we have gone through the results and taken on board some of the suggestions on how we can apply them at the school. I will be meeting with Sandra Hartley and Peter Whitfield being the School Council Chair and P&C president respectfully to look at the survey feedback. A group of staff will be looking at a revised parent communication policy with the feedback from the survey being some of the information that will be used. This policy will then be presented to school council for discussion and endorsement.

The COVID restrictions as stated previously have brought about unexpected benefits with parents and carers not coming in the classrooms before school. These include:

- An increase in independence and resiliency of students
- ✓ A reduction in separation anxiety for children, especially in the younger years
- ✓ An improvement in social skills for students and much improved settling in the mornings
- ✓ A far more productive routine for teachers and students without interruptions
- A considerable improvement in punctuality

Some of the issues that have existed that we must consider in these discussions are:

- ✓ Disruption to morning routines for both students and teachers
- ✓ Parents interacting with children other than their own, causing issues
- ✓ Noise from parents gathering in groups distracting children in classes
- ✓ Parents standing visibly waiting outside classrooms at the end of the day instigating students to cease work earlier than warranted

Currently while these discussions are going on we will continue with no parents in classrooms at the start of the day.

- Parents may wish to come into the class at the end of the day once the students have exited the room.
- We are looking at certain afternoons where the classrooms will be open for parents/carers can come into the classrooms with their child to see what they have been doing and talk about their work.

- Parent rosters are being developed and conducted by each teacher depending on their needs in supporting the children's learning.
- Parents are encouraged to make a time with a teacher if they need to have a meeting. Other methods like Email and the communication book or diary are regularly used by parents to contact staff.

A further reminder that people that come onto school grounds need to come through the front office if not picking up or dropping off children and please be aware of the physical distancing required. All volunteers that are on school grounds are required to sign in and out through the front office as part of our emergency procedures requirements.

Thank you to parents and caregivers for supporting the school with the wide brimmed hats that started being enforced at the start of this term. It is important that we protect our students from the serious issue of skin cancer. Each classroom continues to have sunscreen for students as another measure.




Change of Assembly Day

The Secret She Keeps

The Secret She Keeps, written by Michael Robotham, is portrayed as a psychologically tense book with thrilling drama. The story follows the lives of Agatha Fyfe and Megan Shaughnessy. Megan does not know Agatha however, Agatha knows everything about Megan from where she lives to where she meets her yoga class friends. Although the two women have not met, they have one thing in common; secrets that could tear down a family or build one up.

We are introduced to Agatha as a pregnant middle-aged woman trying to support herself off her job. We are taken into Agatha's personal life and introduced to the idea of Agatha, pretending to be Pregnant, so later in the book she can steal Megan's baby. Michael Robotham wants the readers to feel sorry for Agatha and her loses. Towards the end of the book, the readers are introduced to Agatha's plan to steal her friends' baby straight from the hospital.

We are introduced to Megan in the second chapter as mother of two with another baby on the way. She is described as a happily married women but a with a little secret that could ruin her family. Michael wants the readers to know that Meghan has a beautiful family, adoring friends, and soon, the perfect newborn son. Once her newborn is taken, we feel sorry and bad that Meghan did not get to have a connection to her son before he was taken away.

The themes in the book are easily recognisable as broken trust, manipulation, and family. The theme broken trust is spread out all through the book. For example, when Agatha decided to become close friends with Megan and gain her trust just to break it when she stole Meg's newborn child straight out of the hospital. The author wants us to feel sorry for Megan and for her newborn being abducted and feeling hatred against Agatha for stealing him from his true mother. Manipulation is a big theme towards the end of the book. With Meghan's baby's life in Agatha hands, Agatha decided it was the best decision to give the baby back to the true mother. Except, Agatha manipulated the police and Megan, stating she would only give the child to Meghan or she would kill the baby. So, nobody could have the baby. Lastly, the theme of family relationships is all through book but more clearly towards the end. When the newborn was stolen, Megan and her husband try and keep her family together against their loss and the media.

I believe Agatha's had trouble having a baby, so she turned to stealing babies so she could finally be a mother. The book is so clearly written, that you feel like you know what Meghan and Agatha both went through.
